FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Dear friends,

I write this message after having just arrived home following my sixth trip to Israel. It was a short trip; I was on the ground in Israel for less than five days. The purpose of my visit was to attend the first ever Talmud Israeli Chidon Olami (international competition). For the past seven years, keeping pace with the Daf Yomi cycle, Talmud Israeli has been producing literature for children that combines knowledge of Gemara and rabbinic history, together with the history of Zionism and modern Israel. In 2016, after our own Yael Schulman became Director of Talmud Israeli in the United States, I came on board as an editor of English language publications. Every Shabbat, you can find our four-page glossy publication on the table in the lobby of Anshe Sholom. The weekly publication is sent to hundreds of synagogues and schools around the world.

In 2019 we expanded our activities by introducing the Talmud Israeli Challenge. Six local day schools participated in team competition. Our own Westchester Day School took home first place in both the boys' and girls' competitions. The Chidon began this past June with an opening round exam taken by over 1,000 students. After a second round of examinations in November, the number of competitors was reduced to 15 parent/ child duos, twelve from Israel and three from the United States.

The American finalists were from White Plains, Riverdale, and Cedarhurst. The American delegation stayed at the Prima Kings Hotel in Jerusalem. We had time for some sightseeing, enjoying the latest version of the Kotel Tunnel Tour, though we spent much of Friday and Shabbat reviewing the material for the competition. As is my preference, davening on Friday night was at the Kotel and on Shabbat day at Yeshurun Synagogue on King George Street.

On Sunday, December 15th the *Chidon* finals were held at the Jerusalem Theater. After a difficult written exam in the morning, the televised show began at 5:00PM and lasted for three hours. Special guests included Moshe Leon (Mayor of Jerusalem), Rafi Peretz (Minister of Education), and, pre-recorded, Ruby Rivlin (President of Israel). Leading an illustrious panel of judges was IDF Chief Rabbi Eyal Karim.

The IDF Cantorial Choir, led by Chief Cantor Shai Abramson performed several favorite Hebrew songs. There was a multi-generational Siyyum HaShas and an emotional

speech given by Prize of Israel recipient Miriam Peretz.


In the end, Eytan & Jordan Rosenstock of White Plains took home the Diaspora Championship and finished in the final eight. Eytan is my student at Westchester Day School, where his classmates watched the Chidon livestreamed on YouTube.


In my limited free time, I had two memorable experiences. A) I went to the Underground Prisoners Museum in the Russian Compound. I was brought to tears standing in the gallows chamber where Moshe Barazani and Meir Feinstein took their lives in defiance of the British Mandatory authorities. The memorial room to the Olei Ha-Gardom felt like a sacred space of the highest order. B) I hiked to the top of the Mount of Olives and looked down, at sunset, upon the Temple Mount. It was surreal as I experienced a messianic sensation for the first time ever.

Alas, my time in the Holy Land was all too short. Hopefully the next trip will not be years away.

We will continue to look for affordable ways to increase safety at Anshe Sholom.

Many of us would have thought it absurd to discuss stroller parking on Shabbos at Anshe Sholom, but recently there is a veritable stroller traffic jam. Don't get me wrong—this is a good dilemma. Marc Bessler, Laurie Kracko and I are considering the best ways to develop some programming for the children on Shabbos, to keep them interested and culturally enriched, and to maintain the proper decorum at Shul for the important work of Davening.

The next two months are the coldest of the year, but it's warm inside at Anshe Sholom. The personal connections we make at Shul are the best rewards of all. I look forward to seeing you all at Services, a Kiddush, or a Simcha in 2020.



Several Reasons Why Our Feet Must Be Together in the 'Amidah'

There are several explanations as to why, when praying the 'Amidah', we must stand with our feet together, resembling Angels with one leg. There is a risk that our transgressions will be brought before God when we pray, which would possibly negate our prayers and requests. As such, when we stand before God, we try to mirror the Angels, who do not sin, and avoid our sins coming before God.

Additionally, it is not easy to move around normally when our feet are placed together. This is an indication to us of our limitations as human beings, and our need to rely on HaKadosh Barukh Hu (the Holy One, blessed be He), at all times.

One other explanation is that since we are standing in order to speak with the Shekhinah (God's holy presence), we must remove all physical thoughts from our mind and appear as if we are the Malakhei HaShareth (Ministering Angels).
