FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Dear friends,

It is almost a rite of passage for Jewish children to bake matzah in an educational setting. Typically, this is done in nursery school in a playful and fun environment. The final product, while possibly looking like matzah, is not really matzah and is not kosher for Passover. I don't recall baking matzah in my youth at Temple Israel of Great Neck's Bet-Hagan nursery school or at the North Shore Hebrew Academy. But when I was in 10th grade at HAFTR High School, my Gemara teacher Rabbi Brissman took the class to Shatzer Matzah Bakery in Brooklyn. It was an unforgettable experience, highly informative, and worth a trip down memory lane in this column.

I had long known that matzah needs to be baked in less than eighteen minutes. But I never really understood what that meant. Upon arriving at Shatzer, my classmates and I first noticed a large digital clock high on the wall. It read 20:00. It was explained to us that each shift in the matzah factory lasts exactly twenty minutes. Eighteen minutes are allotted for baking and two minutes for cleanup. The clock starts ticking down as soon as the water is poured into a huge bowl of flour. The water, stored overnight in a container so as not to be too warm or too cold, is kept in a separate room that is connected by a small window to the large baking hall. The purpose of the separation is to make sure that no liquid comes into contact with flour other than when intended and under supervision. This avoids the unintentional production of chametz.

As the water is poured into the flour, a large, burly guy uses his strong arms to knead the mixture into dough. When the dough is ready to be rolled, he flings pieces of dough to ladies waiting at the long table. Fifty Russian-Jewish women, 25 on each side of the table, are ready to use their rolling pins to flatten and shape the dough. Each woman is expected to produce a pound of matzah (7 large circular matzahs) per shift. They have to act fast. When a woman is ready to have her round piece of flattened dough taken away and brought to the oven, she yells "matzah!" After it is taken away and she is ready to receive another glob of dough, she yells "teigel!"

A man carrying a long wooden stick lifts the readied piece of dough off the long table and takes it to another table where holes are punctured in it. The holes prevent air pockets from forming in the matzah, which might render the flat-bread into chametz. Then, the dough pieces are again lifted up using the long pole and brought to the oven operator. The ovens are very hot, typically 800 degrees Fahrenheit. Each piece of dough remains in the oven for approximately 45 seconds. Any longer, and the matzah would be burned to a crisp. When the horn sounds after


eighteen minutes there is a mad dash to eliminate the chametz. The parchment paper on the long table is thrown out and replaced with a new sheet. The floor is swept and any leftover dough in the big bowl is discarded. The matzahs are left to cool and an hour later are packaged in cardboard boxes for sale. All throughout the baking process, the mashgiach instructs the workers to say "L'shem matzas mitzvah," meaning "For the sake of the production of matzah to be used in fulfilment of the mitzvah."

I have been back at Shatzer several times since that first trip in 1997, though I never had another opportunity to participate in the actual baking process. Maybe this year, if I'm lucky.

The Wicked Celebrate and the Righteous Struggle



Search for Chametz (בַּדִּיקת חָמֵץ) – On Tuesday night, April 7th (after 7:45PM) we search our homes for chametz. Customarily we use a candle, feather, and spoon. For safety reasons it may be preferred to use a flashlight instead of a candle. This is intended to be a thorough and serious search of all locations where chametz might possibly be found. If the home was previously cleaned and there is no expectation to find any chametz, it is advised to "plant" ten small pieces of bread throughout the house. The search begins with a blessing: אַתָה ה' אַלקינוּ מַלֶּד הַעוֹלָם אַשֶּׁר קַדְשַׁנוּ בְּמַצְוֹתֵיו וְצָוָנוּ עַל בְּעוּר אר When the search is concluded, all chametz that has been collected should be stored in a safe location in advance of burning it the next day. A declaration is made in Aramaic or English stating that all chametz that we do not know about should be considered ownerless like the dust of the earth.

Burning of the Chametz (בְּעוֹר חָמֵץ) — On Wednesday morning, April 8th (8:00AM) we burn the last vestiges of chametz in our possession. One is permitted to eat chametz on Erev Pesach only through the fourth halachic hour of the day. One may own chametz through the fifth halachic hour of the day. The fifth hour is the last chance one has properly to fulfill the mitzvah of destroying one's chametz. After the burning is done, we make a declaration in Aramaic or English stating that all of our chametz (whether known to us or not) is considered ownerless and worthless like the dust of the earth.

Latest time to eat chametz: 10:46AM Latest time to own chametz: 11:52AM

Sale of Chametz (מְבִירָת חָמֵץ): For several centuries it has been customary to sell non-perishable chametz products to a non-Jew before Passover, with the foreknowledge that the sale will be undone immediately after Passover. This sale is legally binding in both Jewish and civil law; accordingly it should be treated seriously and not viewed as a legal fiction. Congregants are advised to fill out an authorization form granting Rabbi Hoffman the power of attorney to effect the necessary transaction. The sale will be concluded at 11:00 on April 8th, after it is no longer permissible to eat chametz, but still as yet permitted to own chametz. If you will be in a different time zone on April 8th please indicate as such on the authorization form, as this might necessitate a separate sale.

Ma'ot Chittim (מעוֹת חטים) – We are obligated to give charity before the holiday so as to ensure that indigent Jews will be supplied with their holiday needs. Literally, this concept can be translated as "coins for wheat." All Jews, even those on lowest rung of the socioeconomic ladder, must be given wine, matzah, and other Kosher for Passover essentials. You can fulfill this obligation by donating to the Anshe Sholom Passover Fund. Your charitable contribution will help feed Jews in Israel and New York.

Fast of the First Born (תַּעָנִית בְּבוֹרוֹת) — On the Eve of Passover it is customary for firstborn males to fast in remembrance of the Plague of the Firstborn. While the Egyptians perished, the Israelite firstborn were spared by God. The tradition in most communities is to offer the firstborn a way of exempting themselves from this fast. A celebratory Siyyum (7:30AM) is made upon the conclusion of a tractate of Talmud. This is followed by a meal to which the firstborn are invited to participate. We will have a Siyyum on Tractate Hullin following morning services.
